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AAP Welcomes Introduction of “Orphan Works” Bills

AAP has written to the Chairmen and Ranking Members of both the Senate and House Judiciary Committees expressing the Association’s appreciation for the introduction of legislation (S.2913 and H.R. 5889) to address the problem of “orphan works” – works under copyright whose owners cannot be identified or located for the purpose of obtaining permission for their use by third parties. As reported previously in the *Monthly Report*, AAP testified at House hearings in March on the need for such legislation.

In letters of April 29 to Senators Patrick Leahy (D-VT) and Orrin Hatch (R-UT) and Representatives John Conyers (D-MI) and Lamar Smith (R-TX), AAP President and CEO Pat Schroeder stressed the commitment of AAP’s members to support legislative efforts to provide a “meaningful” solution to the orphan works conundrum. While supporting the basic framework of both bills, AAP currently prefers the Senate version and Mrs. Schroeder expressed AAP’s willingness to work with the bills’ sponsors and their staffs to resolve publishers’ specific concerns.

AAP Applauds NY Libel Tourism Law, Welcomes Introduction of Libel Tourism Bills in Congress

AAP welcomed the signing of a bill in New York that will make it harder for “libel tourists” to threaten authors and publishers with foreign libel suits. The new law, the “Libel Terrorism Protection Act,” which was signed April 30 by Governor David Paterson, prohibits the enforcement of a foreign libel judgment unless a New York court determines that it satisfies the free speech and free press protections guaranteed by the First Amendment and the New York State Constitution. It also allows New York courts, under certain circumstances, to exercise jurisdiction over non-residents who obtain foreign libel judgments against New Yorkers.

AAP President Pat Schroeder wrote to Governor Paterson congratulating him on the signing of the bill, and expressing the thanks of the Association’s members, many of whom are located in New York. “The enactment of this important legislation sends a strong message that New York is committed to protecting the free speech rights of its citizens,” the letter stated. Mrs. Schroeder expressed the hope that “the new Libel Terrorism Protection Act will serve as a model and that other states will follow New York’s lead.”

Just before the Memorial Day recess, bi-partisan legislation (H.R. 6146) was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives that would prohibit U.S. courts from enforcing foreign defamation judgments unless the court determines that the judgment is consistent with the First Amendment. Spearheaded by Rep. Steve Cohen (D-TN), the legislation was co-sponsored by House Judiciary Committee Chairman John Conyers (D-MI) and nine members of the Committee (Issa, Nadler, Berman, Coble, Lofgren, Jackson-Lee, Wexler, Johnson, and Gutierrez), along with Reps. Mark Udall (D-CO) and John Yarmuth (D-KY).

Taking a slightly difference tack, but aimed at the same problem, legislation has been introduced in the Senate (S.2977) by Senators Arlen Specter (R-PA) and Joseph Lieberman (I-CT) that would create a federal cause of action to determine if a foreign defamation suit brought as a result of publication or speech in the U.S. would be allowable under U.S. law. The bill would enable a U.S. author or publisher sued for libel in a foreign court to collect treble damages if the U.S. court determines that the foreign plaintiff “intentionally engaged in a scheme” to suppress the defendant’s First Amendment rights. A House companion bill (H.R. 5814) was introduced by Rep. Peter King (R-NY).

AAP President Pat Schroeder has written to the bills’ sponsors welcoming the new federal initiatives and reiterating the industry’s concern about libel tourism and AAP’s commitment to finding a workable legislative remedy.

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AAP Joins in Legal Challenge to Oregon Censorship Law

AAP joined with six Oregon booksellers, the ACLU of Oregon, and a host of others in challenging a new Oregon law that criminalizes the dissemination of sexually explicit material to anyone under the age of 13 or the dissemination to anyone under the age of 18 of any material with the intent to sexually arouse the recipient or the provider. The new statute, which makes no provision for judging the material as a whole, nor for considering its serious literary, artistic, or scientific value, went into effect on January 1.

The lawsuit, filed April 25 in federal district court in Portland, seeks an injunction barring enforcement of the statute, which it calls unconstitutionally vague and overbroad and which burdens the exercise of free expression and creates a chilling effect on the sale, display, and dissemination of constitutionally protected speech. Notably, the law contains no exception for family members and in a statement issued on April 28, the Oregon ACLU remarked that among those who could be prosecuted are a 17-year-old girl who lends her 13-year-old-sister a copy of Judy Blume's *Forever*, or a grandmother who gives her 7-year-old grandson a copy of Robie Harris' widely-praised book on human sexuality, *It's Perfectly Normal*. The American Booksellers Foundation for Free Expression, one of the plaintiffs in the case, sees enforcement of the statute as a "logistical nightmare" for Oregon booksellers.

"While the statute may have been a well-intentioned effort by the Oregon legislature to target sexual predators,

it is so broadly written that it threatens all kinds of constitutionally protected speech. Surely we can protect our children without shredding the Constitution," said AAP President and CEO Pat Schroeder.

In addition to AAP and ABFFE, plaintiffs in the case include the Freedom to Read Foundation, the Comic Book Legal Defense Fund, Powell's Books, Annie Bloom's Books, Planned Parenthood of the Columbia/Willamette; and the Cascade AIDS Project, among others.

AAP Joins in Legal Challenge to Indiana Retailer Registration Law

AAP has joined with booksellers, librarians, civil liberties groups and a host of others in challenging a new state law that tramples on the First Amendment rights of booksellers and other retailers in Indiana. The plaintiffs, including ABFFE, the Freedom to Read Foundation, and other members of Media Coalition, as well as independent booksellers, the Indiana ACLU, and the Indianapolis Museum of Art, filed suit May 7 in federal district court in Indianapolis and are seeking an injunction barring enforcement of the statute, which goes into effect July 1.

The new law requires any retailer who creates a new establishment or relocates an existing one after July 1 and who sells, or intends to sell, any "sexually explicit material,"

to register with the Indiana Secretary of State as an "adult" business and to pay a \$250 registration fee. Registration information would be passed along for monitoring by local governments, in effect creating a blacklist of "adult" retailers. The statutory language is so broad and ambiguous that bookstores carrying art and photography books, sex and health education materials, romance novels and even classic fiction would be caught up in the "adult" business registry.

AAP President and CEO Pat Schroeder said that "Forcing bookstores to register with the government based on the content of the books they sell--and to pay \$250 for the privilege--is abhorrent. It runs contrary to every understanding of our First Amendment rights. We hope the court acts quickly in granting the request for an injunction."

AAP to Co-Sponsor Program on Libel Tourism at ALA Annual Conference

A program to be held at the American Library Association's 2008 Annual Conference will take a hard look at the use of foreign libel laws as a weapon to intimidate and silence American journalists and authors. The program, *The Biggest Threat to Free Speech You May Never Have Heard Of!*, is scheduled for Monday, June 30 from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. in Room 204A at the Anaheim (CA) Convention Center.

Under the joint sponsorship of the AAP Freedom to Read Committee

and the ALA Intellectual Freedom Committee, the program will feature Dr. Rachel Ehrenfeld, the New York-based author whose battle to have a British libel judgment against her declared unenforceable in the U.S. inspired New York's newly enacted "Libel Terrorism Protection Act," and J. Millard Burr, co-author of *Alms for Jihad*, which was pulped by its British publisher under threat of a libel suit by the same Saudi billionaire who went after Dr. Ehrenfeld. First Amendment attorney Jonathan Bloom (Weil Gotshal & Manges, LLP) will serve as moderator.

AAP Higher Ed Group Hosts Hill Briefing on Math Remediation

AAP Higher Education held a congressional staff briefing on April 30 to spotlight ways in which publishers and faculty are working together to improve college student success through math remediation. Representatives from Bedford, Freeman & Worth Publishing Group, Cengage Learning, John Wiley & Sons, Co., The McGraw-Hill Companies, Pearson, and Reed Elsevier joined Dr. Cynthia Young, a professor at the University of Central Florida and a Wiley mathematics textbook author, at the briefing. The presentation focused on the changing landscape in higher education classrooms, students

who are less prepared for college-level work, how professors are tackling these challenges and using technology to improve students' success rates in math, and the tools instructors use to help meet their students' needs.

Recognizing the significant and growing impact of books in audio format, on May 19 AAP announced the launch of a new audiobook extension to its highly successful Get Caught Reading public awareness campaign. A new audiobook Get Caught Listening subcommittee has been created within the organization to spearhead the launch, development, and implementation of the new campaign. The subcommittee members represent the industry's leading trade audiobook publishers, including BBC Audiobooks America, Hachette Book Group USA, HarperCollins Publishers, Macmillan, Random House, Simon & Schuster, along with representatives from the Audiobook Publishers Association.

The campaign incorporates both pre-recorded audio voiceovers of traditional and celebrity authors sharing their passion for audiobooks, complemented by a print campaign of those authors "getting caught" listening to their favorite book in audio

First National Latino Book Club Launched

On May 7, AAP's Publishing Latino Voices for America Task Force joined the national Latina organization Las Comadres, and Borders in announcing the launch of Las Comadres and Friends National Latino Book Club at select Borders stores in Arizona, California, Florida, Illinois, Massachusetts, New Mexico, Texas and Utah. Membership is open to anyone interested in reading English-language works written by Latina or Latino authors. Best-selling author Esmeralda Santiago will serve as the official spokesperson for the book club.

With a membership of 10,000 in sixty cities nationwide, Las Comadres Para Las Americas, the book club's parent organization, fosters communication on a variety of topics through its community-building, networking web site www.lascomadres.org. The book club grew out of a series of highly successful monthly teleconferences hosted by the Las Comadres network, each one featuring a book club-selected author. The first Las Comadres live event was held at

the Borders' Columbus Circle location in New York in March. The initial launch of the Las Comadres and Friends National Latino Book Club will be limited to 15 cities, but future plans call for expanding the book club to all sixty cities where Las Comadres' members are located.

INTERNATIONAL COPYRIGHT ENFORCEMENT

Asia Trip

Patricia Judd, Executive Director of International Copyright Enforcement and Trade Policy, spent a productive two weeks in April in the Republic of Korea and the People's Republic of China. In Korea, she participated in the 28th International Publishers Association Congress, speaking on a panel on piracy moderated by Deborah Wiley (John Wiley & Sons), chair of AAP's International Copyright Protection Committee. She also met in Seoul with Korean and international publishing industry representatives, U.S. and Korean government officials, and local counsel.

In China she joined representatives of the Publishers Association (AAP's counterpart in the U.K.) in meeting with member publishers, counsel, and local and national Chinese government officials to discuss ongoing anti-piracy efforts.

During Ms. Judd's visit to China word was received that a Punishment Decision had been issued following up a raid in March in the city of Hangzhou. The decision, issued by the Zhejiang Provincial Copyright Bureau on April 10, imposed a fine of RMB50,000 (more than US\$7,000) on the prestigious Zhejiang University, ordered an immediate end to infringing activities, and confiscated 420 infringing items in stock.

INTERNATIONAL FREEDOM TO PUBLISH

AAP Supports Challenge to Ideological Exclusion Provisions of Patriot Act

AAP has joined in filing an *amicus* brief to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit seeking to have the ideological exclusion provisions of the USA Patriot Act declared unconstitutional. The Patriot Act bars from entry into the United States anyone who has "endorsed or espoused" terrorism. The brief was filed in support of a lawsuit brought by PEN American Center, the American Academy of Religion, and the American Association of University Professors on behalf of Islamic scholar Tariq Ramadan, who was denied a visa after being offered, and accepting, a tenured professorship at Notre Dame.

The brief argues that the Patriot Act provisions are merely a re-working of the old, discredited McCarran-Walter Act exclusion provisions. Enacted during the Cold War to bar entry to communists and communist sympa-

thizers, the McCarran-Walter Act was used to keep out a host of distinguished literary figures whose political views were suspect, including Nobel laureates Gabriel Garcia Marquez, Pablo Neruda, and Dario Fo, acclaimed British novelist Doris Lessing and Swedish author Jan Myrdal. AAP's International Freedom to Publish Committee was instrumental in lobbying for repeal of the McCarran-Walter Act's ideological exclusion provisions.

Noting that the Supreme Court has upheld the First Amendment right to "exchange ideas face-to-face," the *amicus* brief argues that ideological exclusion is "a content-based restriction of speech that is both unconstitutional on its face and capable of immeasurable harm to vital discourse and debate in its application." In addition to AAP, the *amicus* brief was filed on behalf of the Association of American University Presses, the American Booksellers Foundation for Free Expression, the Association of American Law Schools, and others.

SMALLER & INDEPENDENT PUBLISHERS

SIP Annual Meeting Postponed Until Fall

Notwithstanding the fine program and high hopes for combining this year's AAP Smaller and Independent Publishers Annual Meeting with BookExpo 2008 in Los Angeles, registration was disappointing.

The decision was made to postpone the 10th Annual SIP Meeting until the fall, and to hold it in New York. This will give publishers an opportunity to dedicate a full day to the program at a time of year that offers a unique cycle of educational opportunities and programs developed specifically for independent publishers. The Miriam Bass Award for Creativity in Independent Publishing, which was to have been presented in Los Angeles, will be given at the fall meeting instead. As announced previously in *The Monthly Report*, Archipelago Books, a Brooklyn-based not-for-profit literary press which specializes in world literature, is the recipient of this year's award.

PSP Submits Comments on New NIH Public Access Policy

Following implementation of a new mandatory manuscript submission policy (see *Monthly Report* Feb. 2008), the National Institutes of Health issued a Request for Information (RFI), with a May 31 deadline for comments. A response from AAP's Professional & Scholarly Publishing Division was posted to the NIH RFI Public Assess Comments web site on May 30 by Allan Adler, AAP Vice President for Legal and Government Affairs.

In addition, two supporting documents were submitted separately as addenda to the NIH Office of Extramural Research. The first is a legal opinion by Jon Baumgarten (Proskauer

Rose) analyzing the policy and highlighting its inconsistencies with respect to U.S. and international copyright law. The second addendum is a letter of March 17, 2008 to NIH Director Dr. Elias Zerhouni from the chairman and vice-chairman of the PSP Executive Council, which was submitted during the previous public review period.
